Current Outcomes – Low Incidence

- About 25% working less than full-time, low wage, limited benefits
- 20%-40% of students have the goal of obtaining sheltered workshop employment

Scientifically-Based Research

 "Research that applies rigorous, systematic, and objective procedures to obtain relevant knowledge [NCLB, Title I, Sec. 1208(6)]

Evidence-Based Medicine

 "Evidence-based medicine is the integration of best research evidence with clinical expertise and patient values" (Sackett, Strauss, Richardson, Rosenberg, & Haynes, 2000, p. 1)

Evidence-Based Education

- "The integration of professional wisdom with the best available empirical evidence in making decisions about how to deliver instruction."
- Defines professional wisdom as "the judgment that individuals acquire through experience."

(Whitehurst, 2002)



Evidence-Based Practice

 "A decision-making process that integrates the best available research evidence with family and professional wisdom and values" (Buysse & Wesley, 2006; Snyder, 2006; Winton, 2006)

Wisdom Theory and Research

- Wisdom is a process of balanced decisionmaking as contrasted to specific content.
- Wisdom is strongly informed by tacit knowledge (experience-based knowledge).
- Wise people move beyond knowing to acting.

Sternberg (2003, 2007) Baltes & Standinger (2003)



- Knowledge chains are characterized as moving through the "states" of data, information, knowledge, and wisdom
- People are much more likely to access and use knowledge if they have a trusted ally to guide them (knowledge brokers)

Wisdom-Based Action

- Wisdom-based action involves:
 - ✓ Engage with trusted allies over time
 - Be attuned to vision, values, previous experience, and contextual factors (individual, family, service system, community)
 - Engage with best available research, most relevant experience, and most current policy
 - Match knowledge to be consistent with values, vision, previous experience, and context
 - ✓ Make a wise decision balanced and informed
 - ✓ Act on the decision staying connected to trusted allies

Multiple Criteria for Truth

• Researcher: "The research says..."

 Parent team member: "Well, the research says that, but it's also true."



- Match knowledge to be consistent with
 ✓Values
 - ✓ Vision

 Context (individual factors, family factors, local service system factors, overall community factors)

- Make balanced and informed decisions in creating action plan
 - Judge which knowledge to use in light of values, vision, and context
 - Identify whose interests should be considered in making a decision
 - Weigh long-term and short-term considerations
 Consider what resources will be needed for you to take action



Take action and stay connected to trusted allies
 ✓ Learn from successes and setbacks
 ✓ Solve unanticipated problems
 ✓ Be open to others' advice
 ✓ Confront next challenge




Knowledge Over-Load

- 6,020,000 hits for family partnerships in special education






Knowledge-to-Action Conceptual Framework


